**...Caty Dioguardi - volunteer at the IHF Center in Chiang Rai, Thailand**



When I decide to have a chat with volunteer Caty Dioguardi at the IHF Center in Chiang Rai she is just coming back from a visit to the Doctor, where one of the children has had his ear looked at. The children greet her with cheers and affectionate hugs as the rickety old truck struggles up the driveway. Caty picks a shady spot along a wall of the

little house the volunteers share, and sits down on the ground. Immediately a couple of children cuddle up on her lap. As she starts talking to me she absently and gently strokes one of the boys' back and the content look on his face says it all. Caty is a remarkable young woman providing these unfortunate children with some of the unconditional love and affection they crave.

Caty is a 24 year old professional photographer from New York. She starts telling me her story; "When my friend and I planned a seven month overseas trip we knew we wanted to include some volunteer work along the way" she says. "We did some



searching and found IHF via the Internet. I liked the fact that IHF is a non government, non religious organization. Originally, we planned to stay at the center for a month". Caty stops, taking a moment to look around the yard, where children of different ages are playing. "But how could I leave?" she says with a sigh. "When my month was up, travelling to other places didn't seem as appealing anymore. I wanted to stay with the children I had come to know and love." Caty has now spent three months at the center. In only a few days time she is forced to leave as her visa runs out. "I am definitely coming back" she tells me with determination. I ask Caty what made her want to dedicate her time to helping others, and she tells me it has always been a very natural part of her life. Growing up, she'd often spend time with her mother as she worked and volunteered at a shelter for battered and abused women. Caty has followed in her mothers footsteps, and has

done other volunteer work before. "IHF is doing such a good thing for these phenomenal children" she says. "They are cared for, fed, educated and when needed they get medical attention" she continues. Life at the center can offer some new challenges for a volunteer used to the comforts and luxuries of the western world. Squat toilets, bucket showers and thin sleeping mats on hard beds are just a few examples. "I personally have had no problems adapting to all that" says Caty. "My biggest problem has been eating white rice for breakfast, lunch and dinner every day, but that is only because I don't like rice in the first place!"



Caty's days are long and filled with the kind of activities a working mother with lots of children might have. While the children are at school she and the other volunteers work on administrative jobs for IHF from an Internet café in town. In Caty's case her background as a photographer means she has been able to contribute to a database filled with beautiful pictures of all the children and the environment they live in. Other volunteer tasks may include things such as shopping for new shoes for school, taking a child to the Doctor, arranging a fun day out on the weekend or trying to reinforce the on hour a day TV-rule. Sometimes the children have disagreements, as all siblings do from time to time. Caty steps in and mediates with a firm but loving attitude. With 28 playful children to look after, patching up little scratches and wounds is also a daily occurrence. "I've gone through a substantial amount of Band Aids since I arrived here" says Caty with a laugh. Most of the time is filled with fun and laughter, though. The mutual love and respect between Caty and the children is very apparent, but when I comment on this she stops me to point out: "It took a long time to gain the trust of some of the children, and finally getting it is probably the best reward for being here" she says, and goes on; "There are children here who have been through hardships that most of us couldn't even imagine. To see such a child grow and push aside their own personal demons is like magic. Some of them were timid, withdrawn or even aggressive at first, but they have slowly started to trust me, one little step at the time. When such a child eventually comes up and give you a hug it's a very rewarding experience!"

When talking about having to leave the children and Thailand in just a few days, Caty gets a sad look in her eyes. Perhaps the hardest part of an IHF volunteer experience is to say good bye...

### Excerpt from our Jakarta weekly Report

#### **Tuesday 4 March 2008**

The children went to school early in the morning as usual. Novi was feeling a bit ill and had to rest so Ayu took over the class with young disadvantaged children that Novi normally teaches. Ayu is so wonderful and responsible.

#### **Wednesday 5 March 2008**

Today we had the popular photography activity with Jackie and his friends. Candra couldn't make it because of the rain. Some parts in Jakarta still get flooded when it rains this much, but here at the centre we don't really notice it.

#### **Thursday 6 March 2008**

Bella and Elin went to the airport to pick up a suitcase with computers donated to the centre from Carol who was in transit to Aceh. In the meantime the classes were run as usual. Riski picked up the bread from the bakery. It was late when Elin and Bella came home.... And guess who was with them.. Carol! All children got excited and happy over having their Mommy back, if only for one day.

All teachers were gathered and Carol took the chance to have a big meeting with all staff to once again explain the rules and regulations of the centre. Many big changes were made and the teachers left late at night enlightened. Carol and all children fell asleep in her room.

#### **Friday 7 March 2008**

All children made little bracelets and necklaces with beads that Jenny Walker had sent. As Carol was going to Aceh later that day she took all children to the hair dressers and beauty salon. All girls got facial and all boys a hair cut. Everyone was so happy, but later that afternoon Carol had to go back to the airport. Siti came around with 10 of her English students to have a bit of an English conversational class with us bules. Friday night was spent preparing presents for Bella's birthday the following day. All children snuck around whispering all secretive until it was time to go to bed.

#### **Saturday 8 March 2008**

Happy Birthday to you!! All children under the direction of Elin congratulated Bella early in the morning before they had to go to school. After a good day in school all children came back and had some birthday cake. After that the photography guys turned up, but today there were no students because of the hindu holiday.

#### **Sunday 9 March 2008**

Busy busy, all children helped to re-arrange the house. English class room was moved upstairs and a living room was created downstairs. All children busied themselves with decorating and cleaning and arranging furniture. When this was finished they sat down to write their sponsor letters for March. It has been a very active and busy week with loads of surprises and treats!

*Have you ever wanted to volunteer but just didn't know where to start? Or did you think you didn't have enough time? We have so many small tasks that can be done from the comfort of your own home. If you are interested or know somebody who would be interested in the below tasks, please contact [ihf@ihfonline.org](mailto:ihf@ihfonline.org)*

## **\*\* (A) Tasks 30 minutes or so a week or one hour or more a month:\*\***

1. Nakuru clinic (Medical): This task involves working with a team to help promote our small but extremely important clinic in Nakuru. You will need send emails and letters to hospitals, clinics and medical associations introducing them to IHF and asking them for help. You can also get involved by organizing a fundraising event. One person on this team will be responsible for keeping an updated list of what the clinic needs, and ensure its updated on our website as well. You will also try and send letters to get doctors and nurses to visit our centres as volunteers.

2. Online Volunteer Outreach: On this task you will spend just 30 minutes a week putting up IHF advertisement for volunteer positions on the web. You will be working with a team of other volunteers and keep an updated spreadsheet of which websites have our volunteer positions posted.

3. Administration Costs: On this task you will be responsible for keeping track of ATM withdrawals made by Carol as she visits the IHF centres worldwide. You will keep a spreadsheet that records these costs and what they were spent on.

4. Childwatch or guardian: On this task you will assign yourself 10-15 of our children and you will be there guardian. This means that if they do not have a sponsor, you will try to find them a sponsor, and email them on their birthday and special occasions. If they do have a sponsor you need to remind the sponsor to email them on their birthday. You will also be involved in gift-drives to collect money, or used toys and books to give to the kids on holidays and birthdays.

5. Googling applicants: On this task you will be doing a quick research on our new applicants to see what their history and skills are before they come to the center. This helps us place people on tasks that most use their skills, and also ensures that we know are volunteers well before they live at our center. You will send in a sentence or two on each volunteer.

6. Researching poverty facts: On this task you will be given a list of questions to research and answer. These questions are related to child poverty in our world. They will be used to instigate discussion on our Poverty Awareness Group Chatroom. This is one of the goals of IHF, to educate the world about the issues and reality of poverty alleviation.

7. Online Retirement Outreach: On this task you will be responsible for reaching out to the older demographic of retired individuals who often have such valuable skills and abilities. You will be asked to contact websites that are frequented by the 50+ demographic. Such websites as senior health sites, civic social groups, retirement community websites, further education for seniors, city park recreation programs for seniors, vacation and travel websites for seniors, associations of retired professors/teachers, or other professional sites for retirees.

8. Annual Budgets Upkeep: Annual Budgets Upkeep: This task will require just one to two hours a month. You will be in charge of putting together the annual budget for each centre, and work directly with the Directors of each centre (via email) to discover any one-time year costs and

other costs that should be considered in the budget. You will also help to work with the Directors to ensure that they keep within their budget.

9. Buildings Maintenance Needs: On this task you will be responsible for keeping track of all needs for our buildings in each center. You can work with ReBuild San Diego, who are hoping to send volunteers to our centers to get these things fixed. You will also need to stay in contact with the Grants Team, to ensure that these needs are mentioned in our grants.

10. Online sponsor facts sharing and outreach: On this task you will be sharing our weekly information about the number of sponsors we have for each program/centre, and the number of sponsors we need with all our active volunteers. You will also inform our volunteers of the number of volunteers we have in the organization.

## **\*\*\* (B) Tasks 60 minutes or so a week or approx. 4 hours a month:\*\***

1. Carol and volunteers travel info: In this task you will be responsible for helping Carol and our volunteers with their travel arrangements. This task includes emailing airlines and requesting that they help to cover part of the cost of the travel.

2. Media: On this task you will be working with Paula to help increase public awareness of IHF programs and projects. You will be trying to get advertising space with magazines, newspapers and journals. You will also be trying to get articles published about IHF and its founder Carol.

3. San Diego local monthly meeting facilitator: On this task you will need to live in San Diego. You will be responsible for getting together all our San Diego volunteers once a month to ensure that all are still involved in their tasks and helping each other. You will also meet any new volunteers and introduce them to IHF.

4. Legal team: While working on the legal team you can research the different requirements to set up legal chapters in different countries. You will also be helping to ensure that all our legal documents are up to date and available. Another task in the legal team is to help to see the legal requirements to change IHF status from a private foundation to a Public fund.

5. Online Sponsor Drive: This task involved emailing websites to find free online ad space so that we can recruit more sponsors for our children. We are currently very much in need of recruiting more sponsors for our children in Kenya. Your help in this task would be really appreciated. You can dedicate as little as one hour a week or much more if you like.

6. Awards: The awards volunteer is responsible for creating and establishing an awards system for our many amazing volunteers around the world. They will start from scratch on this task to decide on types of award, frequency and criteria.

7. Task List Upkeep: This task is to keep our list of priority tasks (the one you are reading now) updated. They will work closely with Carol and the Task team to keep everyone informed on what needs to be done.

### Class to class Sponsorship



At our centers in Indonesia and Kenya, classes are held for the impoverished children in the community. The doors of our center are open to everyone, from young primary school children to older pre-college students. Primarily, we teach english and Computer classes that are designed to provide opportunity for all to take advantage of modern technology and communicate with the world. In this way they can protect their heritage by communicating with the outside world, as well as further their economic opportunity by accessing jobs. In addition to these classes we provide Mathematics classes and Leadership/Lifeskills classes that seek to aid in analytical thinking and provide problem solving skills.

At the moment we have 81 classes, of which only 43 are sponsored. Although we are eager to expand our classes to cater to the demand from the children in our communities, we are unable to afford it as we are already covering the cost of almost half the classes we teach. You can make a difference in the lives of impoverished children and their communities for only US\$ 30 a month. With an average of 20 students in each class you are changing the life of each child for just US\$ 1.5 a month.

These children benefit incredibly from these classes. In some cases it is the only education they get. Children from varying ethnic, religious and social backgrounds befriend each other

are always and this is the foundation for a peaceful world. They learn communication skills that are vital for the future leaders of tomorrow. Most importantly, these classes provide a safe place for children who may otherwise be left on the street. Even when not in class, children welcome to hang out at our centers and just enjoy the learning atmosphere.

Furthermore, the IHF philosophy of "pass it on" means that the benefits don't stop with the children. All of our students are encouraged to pass on the knowledge they learn to others in the community. And in fact, we are proud to see some of our teacher and their assistance, are now our former students.

The classes you support allow impoverished children from nomadic tribes, inner city slums, and rural villages to compete with kids from the best of schools and pass the exams required to continue into any public high schools. The skills we teach them are some of the single most powerful tools to truly help these children rise above the poverty and class they are born into and become the future leaders of their communities.

For those children who have been trafficked, used for child labour, sold as child brides, threatened by mafia ownership, and in other ways abused, it gives them a voice to their stories and truths, outside their immediate slum or surroundings. You and I were able to become educated in a system

of free schooling. Let's take this amazing gift given to you and I and "pass it on" just as these children promise to do!

If you choose to sponsor a class for only US\$ 30 a month, the director of that project will contact you with updates and information about how your donation is having a direct affect on the community. You can also communicate with the class directly. The children love it!

By helping to sponsor a class, you help to make a whole village stronger. We hope to hear from you soon.
